

ROOTS ENTWINED Julia White and Steven White

The romantic view of the artist is that of a tormented soul driven on a solitary pursuit, toiling away alone, while their creations go neglected or misunderstood by others. One instantly thinks of Vincent van Gogh's poverty and madness or Paul Cézanne traipsing about Provence muttering to himself with canvas under arm. But this need not be the case as the companionship and mutual support between artists Julia White and Steven White attests.

Having met while studying art at Queens University, their individual art practices are at the very core of their relationship, so that now they share not only their lives, but a studio as well. This shared

space, as well as values, provides them each with the freedom to pursue their own unique paths and styles, while certain elements silently and gently cross-pollinate what the other is doing. Their roots share a common soil, so that

the diversity which blossoms forth remains cohesive like the flora of any given biosphere.

Julia White's installation, Forest of Columns, comprises a selection from her continually evolving collection of light sculptures. In her own words these luminous columns are "woven out of steel, textiles, vines, cordage and twines. The surface of each column is like an outer skin that, when illuminated, reveals an intricate array of networks like the patterns of root systems, tree branches and vines, as well as the neural and arterial pathways of the human body." Their gently pulsing lucency recalling the quiet breath of the forest, the throbbing of the heart, the rise of sap in the trees and the course of blood through one's own veins.

Integrating as it does the collage sensibility of Robert Rauschenberg with the rusted grace of the objects found in an abandoned barn, Steven White's work on the other hand could be referred to as "rustic Pop." Combining printed images, wooden surfaces weathered with paint, together with found and constructed objects, his wall pieces possess a warmth and familiarity, and give one the sense of having endured the ravages of time, use and the very elements of nature.

Yet as different as Steven and Julia's artwork is from the other's, seen together one can't help but sense that they spring from a common ground, their roots and branches entwining to create an organic whole.

Kristina Maus: A Moment in Time

Nature and landscape painter Kristina Maus works in finely detailed a crylics, watercolours and pencil drawings. She has used her creativity and her technical prowess to illustrate seven books, to teach art for 24 years, and to produce a body of work that celebrates her passion for the natural world. Now retired, Maus has had more time to devote to forest walks on her Brant Township property, to hiking along the Bruce Trail, and to exploring country roads throughout Bruce County. In turn, connecting with nature in this way inspires her paintings of flowers, foliage, rocky shores, and the changing seasons of

rural Ontario.

Maus records these treasures with her camera, using the photographic studies later as reference in her studio. Merging her formidable drawing skills with her reverence for her subject matter, it is the emotional impact of this connection to nature that Maus captures in her painting. A birch tree illuminated by the winter sun, or the quiet eternity of a lake's blue surface, strike deep chords for audiences that share Maus's love for the land.

By capturing and preserving precious moments in nature's fleeting cycles, Maus honours the bounty of beauty that surrounds us. For her, a painting is most successful when it inspires viewers to see the essence of the places and moments that she records and form their own appreciation of nature's profound gifts.
